### General Information

The 2009 annual meeting of the Mid-Western Educational Research Association is being held from Wednesday, October 14 to Saturday, October 17 at the Sheraton Westport Lakeside Chalet Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. Registration and pre-conference workshops will begin on Wednesday afternoon, with the Fireside Chat launching the formal program at 8:00pm. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday will consist of research papers presented in a variety of formats, as well as other workshops, invited speakers, meetings, and social events. The conference will conclude at noon on Saturday, following the final sessions.

Meeting Registration is required of everyone attending or participating in the 2009 annual meeting of the Mid-Western Educational Research Association. Advance payment for full registration for the meeting (as well as current MWERA membership dues) is expected of everyone participating in the conference program. Registrants are provided a MWERA 2009 name tag, which must be worn at all times during the conference. Those planning to attend MWERA 2009 are strongly encouraged to pre-register for the conference and workshops, and make hotel reservations as soon as possible. Pre-registrations and hotel reservations must be received by September 13, 2009. Registrations received after this date may not be received in time for processing, and on-site payment in the form of cash or a personal check will be expected (if double-payment is later determined, a refund will be issued). **Membership** in the Mid-Western Educational Research Association provides reduced conference registration fees and a subscription to the *Mid-Western Educational Researcher*, the official MWERA publication. Attendees are encouraged to join. **All conference presenters must be paid members for 2009**.

### **Session Formats**

### Paper Presentation

Paper sessions are intended to allow presenters the opportunity to make short, relatively formal presentations in which they overview their papers to an audience. Three to five individual papers dealing with related topics are grouped into a single session running one hour and twenty minutes. The presenter(s) of each paper is (are) allowed approximately 15 minutes to present the highlights of the paper. A single Session Discussant is allowed approximately 15 minutes, following all papers, for comments and critical review. A Session Chair moderates the entire session. Presenters are expected to provide complete copies of their papers to all interested audience members.

All presenters are expected to provide copies of their completed papers to the Session Chair & Discussant by <u>September 13</u>. Discussants who do not receive papers on time may elect to not include that paper in the discussion.

#### Poster Session

Poster Sessions are intended to provide opportunities for interested individuals to participate in a dialogue with other interested individuals and the presenter(s) of the paper. Presenters are provided a small table at which interested individuals can meet to discuss the paper. Presenters should provide small, table-top poster-type displays, ancillary handouts, or other table-top A/V materials to augment their discussions. Interested individuals are free to explore these posters as they wish. Presenters are expected to make available complete copies of the paper on which the poster was focused.

### Symposium

A symposium is intended to provide an opportunity for examination of specific problems or topics from a variety of perspectives. Symposium organizers are expected to identify the topic or issue, identify and ensure the participation of individual speakers who will participate in the session, prepare any necessary materials for the symposium, and Chair the session. It is suggested, though not required, that the speakers or symposium organizer will provide interested individuals with one (or more) papers relevant to, reflective of, or drawn from the symposium.

### Workshop

Workshops are intended to provide an extended period of time during which the workshop leader helps participants develop or improve their ability to perform some process (e.g. how to provide clinical supervision, using the latest features of the Internet, or conduct an advanced statistical analysis). Organizers may request from 1.5 to 3 hours, and are responsible for providing all necessary materials for participants. Many workshops are scheduled for Wednesday afternoon, although others may be scheduled throughout the conference.

### Alternative Session

The form, topics, and format of alternative sessions are limited only by the imagination and creativity of the organizer. These options are intended to afford the most effective method or approach to disseminating scholarly work of a variety of types. Proposals for alternative sessions will be evaluated on their appropriateness to the topic and audience, their suitability to meet the limitations of time, space, and expense for MWERA, and the basic quality or value of the topic. The organizer of alternative sessions is responsible for all major participants or speakers, developing and providing any necessary materials, and conducting or mediating the session. Because a variety of approaches may be proposed within this category, alternative session proposals should include a brief rationale for the alternative being proposed.

### **Best Practices Forum**

The "Best Practices" sessions are intended to provide opportunities for individuals or groups to present "best" or "promising" practices impacting both K-12 and higher education. These sessions highlight unique and innovative programs that have demonstrated promise for improving and enhancing educational practice. Presenters will be grouped by similar topics to facilitate discussion between and among the groups and audience. Presenters are expected to make available complete copies of the paper on which the "Best Practices" session focused.

### Professional Development Workshops

### Online Superintendent Licensure Program: Survey Results of Prospective Administrative Candidates Pertaining to the Program's Courses

Wednesday, 2:00 PM to 3:50 PM --- Alpine I Robert Harold Thiede, Ashland University

Ashland University started online courses for a superintendent licensure program in the spring of 2009. To further develop these newly designed courses, we sought out opinions and ideas from practicing administrators who could enroll in the program. The data from the administrators emerged from the results of an online survey sent to 240 administrators. The survey data included reasons to take the online courses, preferable learning activities, essential subject areas and desirable course formats. By possessing this survey data, the course instructors can review, analyze and develop the online courses in order to provide a quality licensure program for current and future students. The goals of the session will be (1) to provide information and materials related to the reasons administrative candidates would take online courses, (2) to outline the types of learning activities and content areas that are most beneficial in online courses, and (3) to explain the online survey and its use as a data collecting instrument. Dr. Robert Thiede, Assistant Professor and Dr. Larry Cook, Chair of the Educational Administration Department at Ashland University will be the presenters.

## How to Design an Experiment Where Groups Are Randomly Assigned to One or More Treatments

Wednesday, 2:00 PM to 3:50 PM --- Alpine II Robert Barcikowski, *Ohio University* 

In this workshop participants will learn how to design an experiment prior to collecting any data where groups (e.g., classes, schools, counseling groups, study groups, etc.) are randomly assigned to one or more treatments. Consider the following example where you have a new program that has the potential to increase reading achievement at the fourth grade level and you would like to design an experiment that would compare this new reading program to your old reading program. You are able to randomly assign schools to each reading program and to assess randomly selected students in each school. In this workshop you will have hands-on experience with a variety of examples using the freeware software Optimal Design and workshop materials to help you determine the answers to questions like: How many schools should I have in each treatment?; What can I do if I cannot get the number of schools required?

### On Being an Effective Journal Reviewer

Thursday, 1:40 PM to 3:00 PM --- St. Moritz Savilla I Banister, Julie Matuga, Tim Murnen, *Bowling Green State University* 

Have you thought about being a journal reviewer, but weren't sure where to begin? This workshop provides direction on how to write several types of reviews. Discussion and activities will address the differences between qualitative and quantitative manuscripts, standards of quality, and how to provide appropriate and effective written comments for authors and editors. The focus of the workshop will be providing reviews for the Mid-Western Educational Researcher, with input from the editors. We welcome new members and graduate students.

## **Modeling Meaningful Classroom Assessment Practices: Improving Assessments in Your Courses**

Wednesday, 4:00 PM to 5:50 PM --- Alpine I Cathryn Chappell, *Ashland University* 

The purpose of this workshop is to assist teacher education professionals in refining and improving the assessments they currently use. The goal of the workshop is that each attendee will leave with an improved assessment, as well as experiences, discussions, and information that will enable each to improve all the assessments they use in their teacher education courses. Through examples, peer review, substantive feedback, and modeling, we work through the predominant forms of classroom assessment. The main forms of assessment, both formative and summative, will be selected response (multiple choice, T/F, matching), constructed response (short answer and essays), performance assessments (including rubrics and differentiation), and growth portfolios. Attendees should bring a copy of an assessment they currently use for hand-on critique and improvement.

## Relational Learning: Peer Mentoring Among Teacher Candidates

Thursday, 1:40 PM to 3:00 PM --- Alpine I Kristen Chorba, Anne Morrison, *Kent State University* 

In education literature, the body of research regarding mentoring has been growing over the past three decades. Current research has focused on exploring mentoring as a way to increase academic achievement (e.g.: Bernier, Larose, and Soucy, 2005), retention (Rodger & Tremblay, 2003), self efficacy (Wang and Wu, 2008), social exchanges (Ugrin, Odom, and Pearson, 2008), and enhance learning (Smith, 2008). This workshop will provide an opportunity for participants to learn about an established mentoring project at a large, Midwest university and to begin thinking about how they can implement a mentoring project in their own teacher education program. Participants will have the opportunity to discuss mentoring experiences both in small groups and in the larger workshop group with discussion leaders, reflect on their own mentoring experiences, and leave with ideas on how to engage students in supportive peer relationships to enhance professional dispositions.





Discussions on spirituality have been minimal due to mis-givens, controversies, and possible legalities: the separation of Church and State. However, studies have shown that spirituality lead to the meaning in life (Baumeister, 1991; Delgado, 2006; Fry 2000). Meaning is important in the performances of teachers and teacher-educators (Demon, 2008). How do education programs facilitate the creation of meaning, pedagogically and professionally? And what impact will meaning have on failing schools and teacher performances? Addressing these questions, the researcher looked at the conceptual framework from reviews, assessed the need, and made certain recommendations. 'Give them Meaning' impacts results in teaching as a vocation, in educational leadership, and institutional policies. 

**ABSTRACT** 

This session will review the results of a state wide study examining factors that influence crisis preparedness and determine the effectiveness of crisis planning in a school district. A researcher-designed instrument used a combination of inventory questions and subjective rankings to examine the relationships between the priority of crisis planning, catalysts for change, and crisis planning activities present. While researchers in crisis planning agree on the need for a balance between reactive and proactive elements in a crisis plan, the study results demonstrate that reactive elements, favoring a law enforcement perspective, are more prevalent in districts than prevention and intervention elements derived from a social work orientation. The study findings raise questions about the reactive orientation of most districts and the tendency for district leaders to increase the priority and presence of safety and security elements only after crisis events have occurred.

### **ABSTRACT**

Response cards provide more frequent opportunities for students to respond and for teachers to assess student knowledge (Narayan, Heward, & Gardner, 1990). Response cards have been demonstrated to increase student participation and test scores in a wide variety of academic settings over hand raising. Used as an intervention, they allow for targeted social grouping and collaboration. Response cards are consistent with the Universal Design for Learning principles in that they provide for alternative means of presentation, expression and engagement. In addition, In addition, they provide teachers with ongoing formative evidence of student engagement and understanding, and are a low cost strategy that can be used with a wide variety of curriculum (Berrong, et al., 2007; Malanga & Sweeney, 2007; Clayton & Woodward, 2007; et al., 2006; Marmolejo, Wilder, & Bradley, 2004; Shabani & Carr, 2004; Godfrey, Grisham-Brown, Schuster, & Hemmeter, 2003).



Headlines in leading magazines and newspapers have drawn attention to "the crisis concerning men in higher education". This postsecondary education crisis is characterized by a lack of male engagement in academic and co-curricular programs. In addition, the percent of men enrolled in higher education has dropped approximately 14% in the last 30 years and men currently make up only 43 percent of college graduates. Clearly these trends suggest current efforts are not effectively addressing issues related to men in college. At the heart of the problem is a failure to accurately understand men's development. This session will offer theory-based explanatory factors related to the negative trends among college men, as well as offer strategies for addressing them.



Dr. Davis serves as Professor in the Department of Educational and Interdisciplinary Studies and is Coordinator of the College Student Personnel graduate program at Western Illinois University. He teaches courses related to higher education and student affairs and his research has focused on identity issues in general and men's development in particular since 1992. Dr. Davis currently serves on the editorial board for the Journal of College Student Development and he has been recognized as an ACPA Emerging Scholar in 1998 and an Annuit Coeptis Senior Scholar in 2006. He has presented and published widely on issues related to men and masculinities. 

# Contemporary Treatment of Reliability and Validity in Educational Assessment

Dimiter M. Dimitrov is a Professor of Educational Measurement & Statistics in the College of Education and Human Development at George Mason University, Fairfax, VA (2003-present). Prior to that, he was part of the faculty in the Graduate School of Education at Kent State University, Kent, OH (1995-2003). Dr. Dimitrov received a Bachelor's degree in mathematics and a Ph.D. in mathematics education from the University of Sofia, Bulgaria (1984), as well as a Ph.D. in educational psychology from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (1995). His publication record includes numerous articles, books, book chapters, and presentations at professional conferences. He is a regular



participant at the MWERA annual meetings since 1994. Dr. Dimitrov's work in the area of psychometrics, cognitive diagnosis, and Rasch modeling has received national and international recognition. In 2007 Dr. Dimitrov was invited to teach a summer school on Rasch measurement in Russia and in Fall 2008 he taught a couple of courses in latent trait modeling at two prestigious universities in Madrid, Spain.
